Pamoza means "together". We work together with the people we serve, and together with people like you, to transform lives in rural Malawi, Africa. Here's a look at some of our achievements in 2016.

3,000

People reached with the Gospel through Bible studies, evangelism, fellowships, and church services

1,600

People served at our clinic. Malaria, malnutrition, and pneumonia were the most common diseases treated.

1,000

Farmers trained on how to make their own fertilizer mix from manure and other natural products.

Christian Outreach

We started home-based Bible study groups in four communities and trained 54 people to lead them. Our efforts helped 400 people accept Christ as their personal Lord and Savior.



Health and Nutrition

Services to Pregnant Women

We started serving pregnant women at our clinic. Now they don't have to walk 5 miles to the nearest rural hospital for routine checkups.



Weekly HIV Testing

AIDS continues to be an epidemic in Malawi - over 10% of the population has it. In 2016, we started providing weekly HIV testing and counseling. More than 400 people were tested.

Agriculture & Food Security

We supported 50 persistently food-insecure households with additional inputs to grow enough food. We also helped each of our four school partners start a one-acre farm where students will learn proper agricultural practices.
